The Education Department of Kishore Bharati Bhagini Nivedita College (co-ed) organized a field trip to Barrackpore for the whole day after getting permission from Principal Sir. Dr. Shib Sankar Sana. Prof. Bapi Das, Dr. Deblina Talukdar, Dr. Deepa Roy, and HOD Joyita Mitra conducted the trip along with the three other arts departments of KBBNC. 3rd and 5th sem honours students were there on the trip. The college provided an amount of 2000 each for the department. for the journey. Collections were also made by students of Rs. 300/-- and from teachers also. There was a total of 16 students from the education department. They were taken to Barrackpore by Bus which was booked for the day. Breakfast, lunch, and evening snacks were provided to the students





Barrackpore is a city and a municipality of North 24 Parganas district in the Indian State of West Bengal. It is close to Kolkata and part of the area covered by the Kolkata Metropolitan Development Authority. It is the headquarters of the Barrackpore Subdivision.

Historically, the town was a military and administrative center under British rule and was the scene of several acts of rebellion against Britain during the 19th Century. The oldest cantonment in India and the Police Training Academy in West Bengal are both located in Barrackpore. The Hooghly is the principal river that flows all along the western stretch of about 50km of the Barrackpore subdivision. This river is also known as the Bhagirathi or the Ganga.

Students of the Education Department of KBBNC visited Gandhi Ghat, Mangal Pandey Park, Serampore Raj Bari, Gandhi Smarak Sangrahlaya, St. Bartholomew's Cathedral, and Tarakeshwar Temple. Mangal Pandey Park has been dedicated to the famous freedom fighter. He was a soldier in Barrackpore Cantonment who rose in rebellion against the British. He ended up wounding two British officers with his musket and sword. He was thus court-martialled and hung to death on April 8, 1857. Students boarded a bus from Manton near to our college and at the time of returning, all got down also at that place. It was a joyful, adventurous trip. My heartiest thanks to our Principal Sir.
